April Program -- Carbon in a Global Perspective

The Breckenridge Chapter April program will be a presentation of research projects undertaken last summer by two of our scholarship recipients, Karin Sather and Ellen Squires. Both are students at St. Olaf College. Karin, a junior, is a Champlin Park graduate. Ellen, a senior, is an Andover graduate. They describe their experience below:

This summer we had the privilege of traveling to Alaska, China, and Siberia to study the dynamics of carbon in global ecosystems. We will be speaking about greenhouse gas production from both aquatic and terrestrial landscapes. Throughout the summer Ellen's research was primarily focused on the terrestrial aspect of watersheds, while Karin's research was stream based. While in Alaska and Siberia we focused on "arctic systems science" which involves approaching carbon on a watershed scale acknowledging that both terrestrial and aquatic components are integrally connected. Our experience in China was a preliminary exploration of methane production from an agricultural watershed focused on making connections for more in depth research in the future. In addition to deepening our scientific understanding of the Arctic and rural China, we encountered people and places many will never have the chance to see. We hope to provide a glimpse of these places in our discussion of our specific research projects and experiences from each place we visited.

- That as persons are able to travel to the best and worst parts of the Earth, return and report such conditions there to others, but no one is able or allowed to go to Heaven or Hell and come back to report on conditions there; yet believe what no one has seen? ;
- That as scientists have said "our nation's overabundant population makes us no longer sustainable for the far distant future" yet we continue to allow immigration?;

- That as we have benevolently and righteously created the Endangered Species Act, yet there are those who connive to weaken or destroy it?;
- That most religions maintain mankind are "stewards of the Earth", yet many fight against population control, knowing full well overpopulation is the prime enemy of sound stewardship of the total "creation"?;
- That our government spends millions to create and maintain National Parks, National Refuges, Wilderness Areas, National Monuments, etc., yet some encourage more expansion of mineral exploration and general development in and around these National treasures?;
- That as water becomes scarcer in many areas, watering of lawns and golf courses extravagantly is not sufficiently controlled and that people are allowed to continue populating water scarce areas?;
- That as many move to lakes, rivers, mountain retreats and ocean shores to observe and live amongst beauty and wildlife, that what they do and their very presence is counterproductive to the health and wellbeing of the natural order? ;
- That the will of the people is most often at odds with scientifically acclaimed "Best Practices" and are adamant about remaining so?;


